The *Food, Home, and Land for One Health* conference aims to explore the interconnectedness of human, animal, and environmental health in a rapidly changing world. Through a series of keynote addresses and interactive panel discussions, the event will focus on the importance of transformative approaches for supporting equity and resilience in food systems, home environments, and land management, emphasizing the need for holistic approaches to health that integrate these domains. Experts from various fields—including public health, nutrition, agronomy, urban planning, and geography—will come together to propose solutions for building healthier urban and rural communities, preserving ecosystems, and ensuring food sovereignty for all. The conference will also highlight innovative strategies for facing climate and environmental change, improving food security, and promoting well-being across human and animal populations.

Launch Activity - Sunday, March 30, 2025 Scientific Café: *Bringing Nutrition to Life Among Vulnerable Populations: Experiences from Latin America and Canada* 

For organizations and individuals working in health, food systems, or international development, nutrition and food security is a ubiquitous concern and priority. This is underlined by a recent global backslide in efforts to end hunger—including increased food insecurity in Canada—and a growing double burden of undernutrition and obesity around the world. We invite you to attend this interactive event, designed to foster formative knowledge exchange around the particularities of nutrition in vulnerable settings, both in Canada and abroad. We will use dynamic activities for attendees to interact with invited experts from Ecuador, Guatemala and Canada who have experience promoting nutrition and healthy food systems through participatory action research, popular education, and farmer-to-farmer (campesino a campesino) learning and advocacy strategies. Invited experts and attendees will share and reflect on pragmatic lessons from their experiences for effective promotion of nutrition in diverse communities. Through these exchanges, we aim to also foster new connections and collaborations.
